


Message from our Chairman - Murali Krishnamurthy

Murali, Mr. Ashank Desai and Dr. R.V.Ramani.







With the drums beating steadily and vocals belting out favorite Gujarati Garba songs for over four hours, the gathered crowd of over 1,300 of this sold out extravaganza clapped their hands and feet (not to mention the dandiyas) to the rhythm of the night. It was a night to dance, a night to celebrate Navaratri, and a night to help the visually handicapped of India by giving them the gift of vision.

In planning for over a few months, the event was geared to raise money for a new 200-bed Eye Hospital to be constructed in the city of Anand, in the state of Gujarat, where over 500,000 are in the need of free eye surgeries. The venue they chose was ideal for this Navaratri dancing, with over 22,000 square feet of dancing space and free parking at the Santa Clara Convention Center in the heart of Silicon Valley.

Another masterstroke was to have Rhythm Master Dimple Patel and his talented group to get the crowd of over 1,300 young and old on their feet and dance the night away. The 50+ volunteers of SEF had the event well organized to the appreciation of all (the tradition of SEF events starting and ending on time was once again visible to all). The evening started with the traditional garba dances in all their varieties (two and three taals) and in between the youngest participants enjoyed their own "railgaadi" dance. After the time-honored Aarti, the evening came into its own as the hall reverberated with the sounds of dandiya sticks beating to the rhythm of traditional and disco songs. The evening closed with awards for best dressers and best dancers.



Apart from all the fun, the extravaganza also succeeded in raising over \$25,000 for the new hospital. Three generous donors pledged \$5,000 each, in the memory of their loved ones with the contributions designated for deluxe rooms for the patients. Additional support was given by Wells Fargo Bank who was the platinum sponsor for the event (who had also supported the Annual SEF Golf Tournament) and generously contributed towards the costs of the event. Amex Mortgage was a gold sponsor. The local Indian businesses also pitched in for raffle and award prizes. With this warm and generous community support, the SEF team is already planning for a bigger and better show next year.

In seven short years Sankara Eye Foundation (SEF) has come a long way in realizing its dream of achieving 20/20 vision by year 2020 in India. Today, SEF is run almost entirely by a group of over two hundred plus (and growing) energetic volunteers across the USA.

The result is phenomenal. Since its inception, SEF has increased the number of free surgeries from 8,000 a year to current rate of over 70,000 this year. Efforts continue to raise the remaining funds required to complete the hospital in Anand. SEF provides extensive feedback to its donors on how their money is used which has resulted in a large number of repeat donors. Sankara Eye Foundation Marches Right through Madison Avenue - Sumanth Rajagopal

On a bright and sunny mid-August Sunday, New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg opened what is by far the largest Indian parade in the United States. The India Independence day celebrations got off to a grand start. Originating at 45th and Madison Avenue, 40 floats and twenty-some groups show-cased the diverse and rich cultural traditions of India, parading along the Big Apple. A gathering of around 100,000 people witnessed the gala along Madison Ave and in Madison Park, where the parade culminated and other festivities continued. Waving bright placards, were 20 energetic volunteers, participating in Sankara Eye Foundation's first parade ever.

These volunteers joined others who were manning the Sankara booth since earlier in the day and distributed brochures and talked to visitors about the Foundation's vision. That a good 20-25% of these people had already heard about Sankara Eye Foundation, is testament to the profound impact of the mission.

The weekend was set in motion the previous day with volunteers from across the country getting together over lunch at a pizza parlor and then setting up a booth later in the evening at the State Theatre in Brunswick, New Jersey at a Bollywood Musical concert. The day after the parade the three day festivities concluded with a banquet at the Royal Albert Palace in New Jersey, where Murali Krishnamurthy of Sankara Eye Foundation addressed the gathering, expounding on the magnitude of the curable blindness problem in India and seeking community support and involvement in eradicating it.



Several local community leaders in the tri-state region, like Rameshbhai Patel, Albert Jasani, Jayeshbhai Patel, Manharbhai Patel and others continue to fully support our mission for vision. The weekend also saw various TV stations interviewing Sankara Eye Foundation volunteers about the various on-going activities in the organization. The enthusiasm of the volunteers in this region towards the cause is unmistakable!

Ambulance

A well wisher of the hospital decided on a 'GIFT' for his wife on her birthday on 30th October, 2005. He placed a new Maruti Ambulance at the hospital on 29th October. On the 30th, he brought his wife along with their family to the hospital and announced a surprise to his wife - A birthday Gift to her as a donation of an Ambulance to the Sankara Eye Hospital, Guntur.

She was moved by his gesture. At a simple ceremony she handed over the keys of the Ambulance to the CEO.



The first use for the Ambulance came on 8th November.

Malla Reddy, a four-year-old boy, was brought to the Hospital on the 8th, with an injury to his right eye. Urgent surgery was needed to be performed under general anesthesia (GA). During the pre-anesthetic checkup, it was detected that the boy had a heart ailment, and therefore needed some tests by a cardiologist to be declared fit for GA. While the surgical team waited, the child was rushed to a Cardiologist in Guntur city in the new Ambulance. Upon clearance by the Cardiologist, he was rushed back, and operated on the same night to save the eye and his sight.

We are sure the parents of the patient appreciated the quick response by the hospital in management of this case. Also the donors would feel satisfied on their thoughtful gesture in donating this ambulance.

Darkness Dispelled – Ayyapa

Master Ayyapa is a six year old boy from the village of Nagarajapalli, Mattur Mandal in Prakasam District about 70 kms from our hospital. He stays with his mother Rachamma who has been deserted by her husband. Rachamma is a farm laborer, living on meager earnings, which are dependent on the vagaries of the farm labor market.

One day Ayyapa had a sudden bout of pain in his right eye. The eye turned red and local medication was of no avail. He was taken to Chilakulurpet (a town 45 kms from Guntur), was examined by Dr Parasuram Aditya and was suspected to have had a foreign body embedded in the right eye. The mother was asked to rush the child to the Sankara Eye Hospital in Guntur. We are pleased that the Sankara Eye Hospital, Guntur has become a popular Referral Hospital for all eye ailments.

Rachamma brought her son to our hospital and he was examined by Dr Kamala. It was discovered that a splinter of wood was stuck in the eye. Most probably the child must have been hurt while playing. Dr Kamala immediately mobilized the operation theatre staff and under general anesthesia the foreign body was removed.

This is what the mother Rachamma had to sav: "I was scared about Ayyappa's eye condition. The sudden flare up and pain made me nervous. I had nobody to depend upon. The hospital is very beautiful and well kept and I was scared - I thought that such a hospital may be costly and I had no money. However, the hospital staff was very kind and they informed me that everything was free.



World Sight Day - V. Krishna Moorthy

Vision is the gift of God. The endeavor of the Sankara Eye Care Institution has been to provide affordable and quality eye care to those affected with curable blindness in India. World Sight Day is an annual event celebrated on October 13th focusing on the widespread issue of global blindness; it aims to raise public awareness around the world about the prevention and treatment of vision loss.45 million people in the world that are blind and 135 million suffer from impaired vision. 90% of them live in developing countries. Due to steadily growing populations and ageing, these numbers are expected to double by the year 2020 making a colossal human tragedy even worse, stalling development and denying a basic human right.

At the Sankara Eye Foundation base hospital at Coimbatore, a variety of events were organized to reach out to various demographic groups. Hoardings with messages campaigning for eye donations and yearly preventive screenings have been displayed in prominent areas of the city with the approval of the City Police Department and Municipal Corporation. As a tribute to our senior citizens, a screening program for all inmates of the Sheela Senior Citizen home was conducted as well. Southern Railway has joined hands in our Mission for Vision and held a booth at the city railway station to educate the public about eye diseases. The response was excellent and many people evinced interest in knowing about eye diseases and preventive measures. Low vision aids play an incredibly important role as a part of rehabilitative eye care services. On this apt occasion, the Sankara Low Vision Clinic, will be established in association with Sight Savers International.

Today, Sankara Eye Society is a premier post graduate training institute. As a part of its continuing medical education program, a talk by Dr. Krishna Vekateshwaran, about The role of the Pathology Lab in Ophthalmology, was organized at the hospital seminar hall. In essence, the annual World Sight Day provided an amazing opportunity for attendees to become more aware and committed to ensuring the right of vision for all.

Focus Karnataka, Focus Bangalore, Focus Gujarat and Focus AP, Phase II: capital projects initiated this year as we stride towards providing quality eye care to the needy of India, as part of our vision: 20/20 by the year 2020. It entails building a state-of-the-art community eye care hospital in each of these places. In addition to a hospital a top research and training center is also planned for in Bangalore. 

Darkness Dispelled - Poomathi

Baby Poomathi is a 22 month old female child from a village called Semmedu who lives with her parents and grandparents. Her parents Mr.Rangaraj, a coolie (Daily wage earner) and Mrs.Radhamani were the happiest ones since she was normal in all aspects like any other child. They had had a consanguineous marriage. Alas! fate was cruel to Poomathi.



Since 3 months of age, she could not see distant objects and she experienced decreased vision in both eyes (since 5 months of age). She was confined to the house and she could not do any thing without the assistance of others.

This was brought to the notice of our field worker when he was undertaking a field survey in that village. The field worker promptly informed Poomathi's parents about our hospital and the facilities.

The baby was brought to the hospital on 8th September 2005, for a detailed examination. The diagnosis was "Adsorbed Cataract with Nystagmus in both the eyes and a squint in the left eye. Cataract surgery was advised with Anterior Vitrectomy under general anesthesia". After regular tests and ascertaining physical fitness, surgery was performed on 20th September, 2005 in the left eye and on 20th October, 2005 in the right eye. She was discharged after her second surgery on 22nd October, 2005.



Now Poomathi enjoys excellent vision. We see joy and hope in her eyes. She is playing and walking like any other child of her age without any assistance.
